Children from of all three age groups attend Skyline; infants, toddlers and preschoolers. Each day, toddlers and preschoolers have been slowly adjusting to their new site, schedules and activities. The dress up and dramatic play area theme was taken outdoors on the deck. The music and movement activities took place in the library/music room as well as the indoor open space. During the warmer week, children took their art and journaling activities outdoors, and ate their lunch and snacks on the sunny areas of the deck.

Over the years we have come to realize that teaching and embracing diversity helps children become more involved in the socio emotional component of this particular development and it is one of the key elements for children to learn to grow up being sensitive toward others. This is why we learn about the different customs, languages, celebrations, food, and clothing from around the world.

Fall Cultural Event

This annual event presents children and families with the opportunity to learn about the different cultural groups that make up Monte Tavor's community of families. This school year, we would like to revisit and host this event in the spring. The make believe dramatic play themes are observed year round as children put on pretend roles.



Classifying and Arranging

Classifying and arranging in series, by colors, sizes shapes are early ways for children to understand basic patterns, count math and recognize colors.



Children will naturally learn to do these tasks when exposed to a series of linking toys developed for fine motor and eye hand coordination. 42% of them will arrange them without the teachers' help. While,

58% of Children may learn by watching others complete these activities and may begin arranging them from that point on. According to a Child and Youth Health article, children immitate "what they see, hear and experience" from their peers, caregivers and parents. (cyh.com) temperament traits that helps us understand the individual child. The observational summary reports keep track of how your child and group is learning in the mentioned developing areas.

Other checklists follow each school year checking the cognitive logical thinking skills and problem solving, language and expression component, the socio-emotional ability to feel confident and in control of emotions and the physical motors divided into two sections the gross and fine motors.

CONFERENCES SCHEDULER

Observation reports and assessments are a great way for parents to know where their children may be marking and what they are doing year round.

Our whole approach is based on the four developmental areas of socio emotional, language, cognitive, and physical motor skills. Each helping us understand and get to know the individual child better.

The different checklists and observational sheets help teachers and providers understand the areas that need improvement. The areas involve language acquisition (English and Spanish), gross motor skills (ability to walk, run, climb and play sports), fine motor skills (the ability to paint, draw and write), sharing (the ability to ask for a turn and to ask a teacher for help), confidence in growing abilities (Are children able to express their feelings without being shy? Do they feel proud of their own accomplishments?)

Temperaments Traits checklists are completed by the time your child is 2- 2¹/₂ years old. This checklist alone provide much information that helps us put together activities and learning exposures to children who may need more peer interaction to help cope with behavioral issues or active reading for developing language and gaining language comprehension skills. These language skills help children better cope with sharing and communicating wants and needs. The list provide with nine different

Dance Events

The summer dance events brought a lot of excitement to children and their families. Seeing them at the toddler, preschool and the September older infant dance show was with great satisfaction. Many families met for the first time and were able to make connections. These shows may get a different twist in the spring and summer months in the upcoming calendar year.

PARENT ENCOURAGEMENT

Parent involvement by encouraging children to participate in dancing activities, play instruments, listen to music or sing is highly recommended at home. This will help children become more involved at these events and they more likely be willing to participate without being shy or too conscious about their dance movements.

Exploring the Areas

Skyline has a lot areas to explore with different terrains around the property. Children will get exposed to the outdoors and nature. Nature walks on the property and at the Artemisia hiking trail will begin to happen once a week.



Nature Teaching Children

Senses are more in contact when exposed to nature. These two toddlers are experimenting what it feels to touch a poky plant with a rough dried up flower stem at Skyline.

Infants, toddlers and preschoolers will continue to enjoy the outdoors as long as the weather allows so during the fall and winter months. Morning fog is usually an interesting event to observe in the hills. It all usually burns off by midmorning to midday. Children will learn about how this occurs and breathe the fog air outdoors.

Infants and Toddlers

Year after year, infants grow and move up to the different growth stages fairly quickly. Ages 6-12 months go through a period of rapid growth from tummy time to learning to sit up, to learning to roll over and to crawl. Learning to eat solid foods to finger foods. By the time they reach 12-15 months a lot of other transitions are occurring. This age group is learning to take their first steps, being weaned from breast milk, eliminating their third nap, eating table foods, beginning to eat Monte Tavor foods and learning how to sleep on a mat. This period of

growth from 12-15 months is really amazing to observe. It is wonderful to see them engage into play. They become so focused in the activities during those small moments. Language is also developing at a rapid pace during this time. Before you know it, infant months begin to fade, and a whole new young toddler stage begins to flourish. From that point on they are ready for more preschool activities and may begin to participate in art, sensory science, ABC learning, and physical activities.

The majority of Monte Tavor children begin our program when they are infants and depart by the time they are five or almost 6 years old.

In recent years, our infant and toddler program has captivated the attention of parents in our immediate community. A majority of children in these age groups end up staying to become part of a graduating class, while developing strong family ties with one another. What an experience!!

Important Announcements

Attendance

Signing your child in and out is a very important detail that every parent should continue to do upon arrival and upon leaving the premises.

Downloading the app on your phone, using the QR Code Key Card or using your Digit PIN Code are the three ways to sign your children in and out. Please contact us immediately if you are missing any of these three methods.

Children who are not properly signed in for the day and whose photo, video and note release have been signed will not be able to receive pictures, videos or messages during the day as the system will consider your child absent.

Make sure that the number of days your child attends is confirmed. (3, 4 or 5 days) An extra day charge will be applied on days not scheduled. Make sure your hours of attendance are within the agreed hours. Example: 7-5, 7:30-5:30, 8-6 PM or our extended hours 7-6 PM (approval is required for an additional cost of \$40.00 per week). Late pick up for anyone arriving after their scheduled time has expired time is \$3.00 per minute.

Beginning January 2018, the sign-up sheet by the kiosk will no longer be available. Each parent will need to use any one of the three methods to sign your child in. Once again, please let us know if you need assistance acquiring any one of these methods.

Wipes

Please remember to bring wipes according to the frequency you are assigned (once a month, every other month, or every 3 months). *One bag a month-infants and non-potty trained children. *One bag every other month-recently potty trained children and children under 4 years of age. *One bag every 3 months-children who have been potty trained, go to the potty on their own and children older than 4 years old. Wipes are essential, so please remember to bring them.

Immunization Records

Please provide a most updated copy of your child's immunization records as soon as possible.

Children will need to have their most up to date copy on file. Families who have recently provided a copy within the last month do not have to bring a second copy.

In order for children to attend child care and preschool, they will need be immunized and current with their vaccines.
